

#### **Conservation outcomes**


EMR builds support for marine conservation and helps form the foundations for future marine reserves and marine protected area proposals by creating ground level information







#### School coast project impresses MP

When students at Te Puru School on the Thames Coast wrote to their Member of Parliament to ask him to support more marine reserves in New Zealand, they were surprised but delighted when Coromandel MP Scott Simpson turned up in person armed with lots of information for their

The students in Class Rata had spent time at Gemstone Bay in Hahei witnessing firsthand the comparison between marine life in the reserve with that in unprotected waters. They wrote to Mr Simpson describing their findings and appealing to him to support the creation of additional reserves around New Zealand's coast.

"I was really impressed at the initiative shown by the kids. Not only had they identified and studied in detail a very important environmental initiative but, by writing their letters, they had considered what steps they could take to promote further change. The project is an example of the high quality learning experiences happening in our primary schools and it is great to see," Mr Simpson

The Coromandel MP visited Te Puru on Tuesday and presented the class with two large laminated maps for their classroom showing the location of the country's 34 marine reserves. He discussed the process involved in establishing a marine reserve and the Conservation Department's proposals for future protected areas.



Arlo said marine studies was "a coal topic", and though his first thought of entering the competition was to go diving, "because it sounded like firm", he came to realize how interesting it was


