Experiencing Marine Reserves - EMR

Since 2002, EMR has expanded to eight regions, with a team of up to 28 coordinators, EMR has guided snorkel experiences for 35547 (53866 including accompanying whanau and teachers) students in NZ marine reserves and over 18447 people have been engaged in EMR organised marine conservation events. The total number of kiwi's engaged in EMR is now 71192!

Summary of achievements in 2018

Expansion and continuation of the EMR programme in 8 different regions including: Gisborne, Northland, Wellington, Coromandel, Nelson, Auckland, Taranaki and Otago. Facebook 'likes' now at 3508. 35 Community Guided Snorkel and Kayak days throughout NZ, involving 2578 participants. Continued exposure in the media nationwide, such as this one about our annual Poor Knights competition trip.

The annual national EMR <u>Poor Knights Competition trip</u> has engaged a total of 274 schools and 408 students to date. Around the country for the 2017 year we had 591 action projects to address marine issues! We have now had community engagement events in ALL of Auckland's marine reserves check out the video <u>here</u>. A highlight of the year was supporting the Young Blake Expedition to the Kermadecs.

Since 2002, WBC has expanded to be sustainable and active in 7 regions, with a team of 23 coordinators, WBC has guided over 83,000 New Zealanders on journeys of discovery and conservation action in their local freshwater environments and catchments, helped to plant over 80,000 native plants next to waterways and restore over 36 kilometres of riparian habitat. Over 69 whitebait spawning habitats have been identified and adopted. The wider community has been reached via over 200 printed media articles and over 75,000 volunteer hours have been contributed!

Summary of achievements in 2018

Continuation of the WBC programme in five regions including: Northland, Auckland, Gisborne, Wellington and Canterbury as well as expansion into two new regions; Hauraki/Coromandel and Nelson/Tasman.

Inspiring action for the environment - many diverse action projects have been reported from regional coordinators this year including inanga spawning site adoption, riparian planting, whitebait spawning habitat restoration, stream clean ups, presentations to local politicians, artwork on display in schools and letters to the editors of local newspapers about local freshwater conservation issues.

Over 1000 people have participated in our local free events including whitebait spawning site monitoring, community planting days, native fish spotlighting nights and community group freshwater biodiversity monitoring workshops.
